The global refugee crisis has exploded over the past decade. Not since World War II have so many people been so vulnerable—and very few can ever return home.

The magnitude of the problem demands "durable solutions at increasing scale," asserts UNHCR, the United Nations Refugee Agency. We partner with governments, UN agencies, and other key stakeholders to evaluate programs and policies to better understand what works. The war in **Ukraine and other disruptions in 2022** have dramatically increased the number of people who have been forced to flee their homes.



AIR's Global Presence | Current and Recent Refugee Projects



For UNICEF Turkey, AIR conducted the first rigorous evaluation of a program that provides Syrian and other refugees with cash transfers and child protection services. The program achieved its goal of improving school attendance, the study found, contributing to the evidence base on successful interventions. Turkey has the largest population of refugees worldwide.

AIR is partnering with USAID, the AVSI Foundation, and the Government of Uganda to help 13,200 extremely poor refugee and Ugandan households "graduate to resiliency." Our researchers are applying methodological rigor to study interventions designed to significantly reduce food insecurity and its devastating health effects on children.

In Myanmar and the Horn of Africa, AIR provides USAID with timely, data-driven analyses and decision-making support for strategic direction of programming. AIR has a demonstrated ability to adapt and pivot in regions of conflict and changing economic and political circumstances. After the 2021 coup in Myanmar and the resulting Rohingya refugee crisis, AIR shifted immediately to remote data collection, encryption, and respondent security. Gathering of on-the-ground perspectives continued without interruption.

AIR's Rigor, Insight, and Solutions

Scaling up effective interventions requires rigorous research, evaluation, and technical assistance. But there are **major evidence gaps** on the impact, cost-effectiveness, and implementation of interventions aiming to improve the lives of refugees and internally displaced populations. For example, AIR's <u>systematic review</u> on education in emergencies found only a small number of impact evaluations and even fewer cost-effectiveness analyses.

Crisis settings come with unique challenges. Refugees and internally displaced people can be highly mobile, vulnerable, traumatized, and distrustful. AIR has developed targeted solutions to navigate these environments successfully.
